in this collection of interdisciplinary essays experts from britain and the united states in the fields of nineteenth century literature and social and cultural history explore new directions in the field of victorian life writing chapters examine a varied yet interrelated range of genres from the biography and autobiography to the relatively neglected diary collective biography and obituary reflecting the rich research being conducted in this area the contributors link life writing to the formation of gendered and class based identities the politics of the victorian family and the broader professional political colonial and literary structures in which social and kinship relations were implicated a wide variety of victorian works are considered from the diary of the radical samuel bamford to the diary of the homosexual george ives from autobiographies of professional men to collective biographies of eminent women embracing figures as diverse as gandhi wilde and bradlaugh the collection explores the way in which narratives contested one another in a society that devoted an abundance of cultural energy to writing about and reading of lives

early modern women s writing and the future of literary history demonstrates that a full accounting of early modern women s literary and creative activities is necessary to the future of literary studies writ large despite benefiting from a rich body of scholarship and diverse critical practices early modern women s writing is still treated as an optional or secondary component of renaissance literary studies as a whole in this book dodds and dowd offer a state of the field assessment of the critical and theoretical debates that have resulted in this state of affairs in order to advance specific visions for the future dodds and dowd examine how perennial questions about authorship canon and literary value have historically influenced scholarship on early modern women s writing and its place within literary studies early modern women s writing has been perceived as belated out of sync with dominant critical trends dodds and dowd show the belatedness of early modern women s writing to be a happy accident that positions women s writing as a resource for the renewal of literary history in both the classroom and in scholarship early modern women s writing shows the way forward for the field whether in the revitalization of formalist approaches to literature through an alliance with feminism or in the integration of newer critical methodologies such as premodern critical race studies this book demonstrates that a feminist literary history that places women s writing at its center is essential to the future of english renaissance literary studies there is in other words no history of english renaissance literature without women writers

women who skirt traditions whether on the frontier of a young state or in a male dominated profession have relied on resilience creativity and grit to survive and to flourish these short biographies of twenty eight female writers and journalists from arizona span the one hundred years since arizona became the forty eighth state in the union they capture the emotions the monumental and often overlooked events and the pioneering spirit of women whose lives are now part of arizona history the

remarkable women profiled in this anthology made the trek to arizona from the big cities of chicago los angeles and washington d c from the green hills of wisconsin and from backwater towns in oklahoma and pennsylvania by covered wagon automobile and later airplane they came with their parents or their husbands or as single women with and without children they came seeking health in the sun blessed dryness of the desert a job a better lifestyle what these women had in common was their love of writing and journalism and their ability to use the written word to earn a living to argue a cause and to promote the virtues beauty history and people of the southwest the narratives in skirting traditions move forward from the beginning of statehood to the modern day describing daring feats patriotic actions and amazing accomplishments they are women you won't soon forget

ft prince 1912 2003 is now emerging as one of the most distinctive voices of twentieth century anglophone poetry born in south africa he came to england in the 1930s where he studied alongside stephen spender and wh auden first published by ts eliot and celebrated in his day by poets as various as siegfried sassoon and john ashbery his poems have long intrigued readers with their formal experiments baroque influences and intellectual puzzles during his own lifetime he found fame with the war poem soldiers bathing 1942 and was known chiefly as a milton scholar however this collection of specially commissioned essays sheds new light on his achievements and reveals his central place in the story of modern poetry enthralled by the canon yet embraced by the avant garde he has influenced poets from geoffrey hill to susan howe a unique conduit between the modernism and the movement british regionalism and american cosmopolitanism yet his poetry is not merely of interest for its continuing influence on wider tradition subtle original and various ft prince's poetry asks important questions about power responsibility and collective memory
